"Jesus Lives: Follow Him" Good Friday 2020

Welcome to our worship for Good Friday, we begin with When I survey (just verse 1 https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=mDkuxElcpdI)

Our reflections this Good Friday are based upon Christ's body. In years gone by, if people were unable to go to Jerusalem for Holy week they recalled the account of the passion of Christ in meditations, and we're going to do that this year as we remember and recall in our dispersed locations, we will reflect on the wounds Christ bore for our sake. Leader 1 We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you, because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Leader 2: Place your hands on your head. With your fingers feel your head and face.

Then Pilate took Jesus and had him flogged. And the soldiers wove a crown of thorns and put it on his head and they dressed him in a purple robe. They kept

coming up to him, saying, 'Hail King of the Jews!' and striking him on the face.

Leader 1. HEAD

We call to mind the cruel crown of thorns pressed into the brow of Christ; The cruel words that twist spikes into the mind ... 'Hail, King – if you are a King!' If ... if ... If only ... Insidious voices, more barbed than any thorn, And each doubt, like a blow across the face, leaves an ugly weal. 'Let this crown pass from me, yet not my will, but yours!' Christ surrounded; Christ hemmed in on every side. The thorny thicket and the sacrificial lamb ... Good seed amongst the choking thorns, thorns that crowd in and press out life. As the lily among the thorns, so is my love. The King of Glory crowned for a while with pain a twisted diadem made by mocking hands. And they plaited a crown of thorns ... Yet a while, and we shall see Jesus, crowned with glory and honour.

There are many kinds of crown – crown of pain, crown of glory – which one will you take hold of?

Leader 1:

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Leader 2:

Take your right hand, hold it, look at it, close your fingers together.

They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns into a crown.

They put it on his head.

They put a reed into his right hand and knelt before him and mocked him, saying, 'Hail, King of the Jews!'

They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head.

Leader 1 RIGHT HAND

We call to mind the reed in the hand of Christ. A palm branch subverted perhaps?

Creation misused to mock its creator! That it should come to this!

The king acclaimed a few days ago now greeted with hoots of derision, set round with brutal boot, with scorn and unbowed heads – rejected for after all he is a most unkingly king.

The hand that held the sceptre, commanding heaven and earth, is now the object of our mockery and scorn.

Yet a while, and all creation will be subject to his just and gentle rule.

There are many kinds of king.

As this is sung for the third time:

Leader 1:

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Leader 2: Take your left hand. Hold it, feel your palm and your wrist.

They brought Jesus to a place called Golgotha (which means place of a skull), they offered him drugged wine but he refused to take it. Then they fastened him to the cross.

They shared out his clothes, casting lots to decide what each should have. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him.

Leader 1 We call to mind Christ's hand of blessing extended to young and old, men and women.

The hand that touched, caressed, healed, brought sight to the blind, sent demons fleeing.

The hand extended over water, bread, wine, with power over wind and weather, with food to nourish all who came; this hand that spangled heaven with stars and this hand now is bound and stilled – fastened to the earth, to the wood of the cross.

Yet a while and this hand will reach out to offer salvation to the world.

There is suffering and blessing in this hand.
Will you take hold of it and receive all that it offers?

As this is sung for the third time:

Leader 1:

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Leader 2: Look down at your feet. Feel the ground and the weight of your body going down into your feet.

Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Cleopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, 'Woman here is your son.' Then he said to his disciple. 'Here is your mother.' And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

Leader 1 We call to mind the feet of Christ: the feet that walked alongside children, women and men.

Tired feet; dancing feet; running feet – running to the tomb of Lazarus – the feet that walked the way of the cross, bitter and slow.

And the people who came to see the crucifixion, did they run eagerly or creep fearfully to the foot of the cross?

And the women, gathered again at the feet of the Lord, this time weeping and heavy with sorrow; powerless to touch the feet that now are bloody and torn.

Yet a while and we shall kneel again at the feet of Christ.

There are many of us now, kneeling in our hearts around these wounded feet.

Gift or burden – what is it that you wish to lay there?

As this is sung for the third time:

Leader 1:

We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Leader 2: Place your hands on your right side, hold them there and feel the movement of your breath.

They asked Pilate to have the legs of the crucified men broken and the bodies removed.

Then the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first and of the other who had been crucified with him.

But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs.

Instead, one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once blood and water came out.

Leader 2 SIDE

We call to mind Christ's riven side – blood and water ebbing into the dust.

Here is the forgiving blood; the baptismal water; the cleansing and lifegiving stream.

Life and death; death and life – the water and the wine, our cup of salvation.

Yet a while and we shall see Christ by whose wounds we are made whole.

Our wounds, the wounds of our church and our world are many.

Touching the wounds of Christ, we seek to be washed in the water of life, to be healed by the blood of the lamb that was slain and to be sent out to minister life and healing through our own brokenness and wholeness.

Leader 1: Christ's body bore our sins on the tree. We are the body of Christ.

We stand now at the cross.
