## "Jesus Lives: Follow Him" Sunday 8 and 15 November 2020

Here we go again, in lockdown but in different context to last time both positively:

- Theoretically at least we have an end date planned as we start
- Those who live alone can 'bubble' from the start
- There is some flexibility around childcare
- We've been here before, and had a few days' notice
- Churches can remain open for private prayer and filming

#### And negatively

- It is not nearly as warm
- We have short days and long nights
- There is uncertainty around what happens next, what will or will not be allowed in December and how long all of this will last.

So how do we respond? This week is Remembrance Sunday, and we remember those who gave their lives that we might live. We might have our disagreements with those in authority, or decisions taken by others, but those who serve in the armed forces, or whose lives have been affected in any way by war have borne a cost way beyond the imagination of many of us.

In the midst of all this though we have the certainty of the faithfulness of God who does not change, who is not fickle and on whom we can totally rely. As we begin this lockdown maybe we can once again find ways to keep our relationship with God alive and healthy, outward looking and upward focussed. We will continue to care for one another, to look out for our neighbours and to listen to families and friends. But let's also take time to

listen to God and to grow in faith. There will be a weekly service on YouTube, with some mailings as well.
