

# WHEATHILL PRIORY BENEFICE

***“Jesus Lives: Follow Him”***

***Sunday 24 January 2021***

Welcome to worship and news for this week.

Our gospel reading this week is one that speaks of hope and new life as Jesus performs his first ‘sign’ (John’s word for a miracle) at Cana in Galilee. These signs are John’s clues as to who Jesus is and what he has come to do. This one is the account of how at the request of his mother, although apparently from the English text not entirely willingly, Jesus gives a wedding feast a huge quantity of excellent quality good wine, from 6 pots that were used for ritual cleansing and washing.

There are some important clues in this, it happens ‘on the third day’ which is of course a crucial part of the Easter account and Easter faith. The theme of ‘new wine’ is one of transformation, taking the old and making it new, and he does so in the jars used for cleansing and washing. This is giving us clues as to Jesus’ ministry:

- To take the old ways and transform them.
- To bring in something that surpasses all that went before and previous expectations.
- To change others experience of God’s hospitality and generosity.

This hope is one that we can live with in our current context and situation. We can, I hope, be reassured by the fact that the wine is good, and there is far more there than was required or expected. Whilst at times we may find it hard to see that which is good or positive. The ongoing situations around us may just be making life difficult, the reality is that Jesus comes and transforms, as well as accompanying in difficulty. Mary tells the servants to ‘do whatever he tells you’, we too are called to listen, to watch and to follow wherever he calls us, because Jesus brings hope.

There is also the Church of England Daily Hope phone line, which has hymns, prayers and reflections.





## **Bible Book Club**


