

# WHEATHILL PRIORY BENEFICE

*“Jesus Lives: Follow Him”*

*Sunday 28 February 2021*

How do you feel about people seeing your weaknesses? Be they physical and obvious or more to do with human frailty and fallibility? I’m guessing that I’m similar to many in that I prefer to be seen as the someone who ‘can do it’ (at times even if I can’t!).

Some of those in the early church had similar issues, particularly with regard to the death of Jesus. For the Jews it was an anathema because their scriptures told them that someone hanging on a tree was cursed and the Greeks believed that the way to succeed was through wisdom. Therefore the death of Jesus was foolish, it displayed weakness and was foolish in that it makes no logical sense.

Paul proclaims that Jesus death, whilst it may look foolish and weak is in fact the way to live. This is because ‘God’s foolishness is wise than human wisdom and stronger than human strength’. When we’re struggling to make sense of the things we encounter in our daily lives and the experiences that come across our paths which do not make sense, sometimes we need to weigh them up against God’s strength and wisdom, and to try to see his ways and priorities in the midst of all that we encounter.

Right now, sometimes that may be hard to do, but we’re still called to seek to find God’s ways in the midst of daily life, and to remember that God uses the unexpected, the unsung and the surprising in his Kingdom. Jesus death humanly speaking makes no sense & looks like total failure. In fact it is the greatest victory of all time, over sin and death. It is indeed God’s wisdom and strength in the guise of foolishness and weakness. May we trust Him more because of that this week.

There is also the Church of England Daily Hope phone line, which has hymns, prayers and reflections.



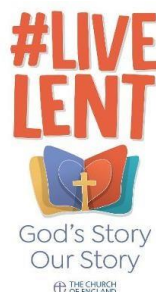
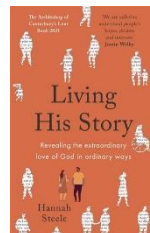
## YouTube
